Daniel's Law

Daniel's Law was enacted in response to the tragic death of Daniel Anderl, the son of Judge Esther Salas and Mark Anderl. The law prohibits disclosure of the residential addresses of certain persons covered by the law ("Covered Persons") on websites controlled by state, county, and local government agencies. The community of Covered Persons includes former, active, and retired judicial officers, prosecutors, and members of law enforcement and their immediate family members residing in the same household.

	Burnell v. County of Bergen, 198 N.J. 408 (2009). Without ambiguity, the court held that the privacy provision "is neither a proface nor a preamble." Rather, "the very language expressed in the privacy clause reveals its substantive nature; it does not offer reasons why OPRA was adopted, as preambles typically do; instead, it focuses on the law's implementation." "Specifically, it imposes an obligation on public agencies to protect against disclosure of personal information which would run contrary to reasonable privacy interests."
1	Executive Order No. 21 (MeGreevey 2002) Records where inspection, examination of copying would substantially interfere with the State's ability to protect and defend the State and its citizens against acts of sabolage or terrorism, or which, it disclosed, would materially increase the risk or consequences of potential acts of sabolage or terrorism. REQUEST FOR RECORDS UNDER THE COMMON LAW

If, in addition to requesting records under OPRA, you are also requesting the government records under the common law, please check the box below.

A public record under the common law is one required by law to be kept, or necessary to be kept in the discharge of a duty imposed by law, or directed by law to serve as a memorial and evidence of something written, said, or done, or a written memorial made by a public officer

authorized to perform that function, or a writing filled in a public office. The elements essential to constitute a public record are that it be a written memorial, that it be made by a public officer, and that the officer be authorized by law to make it.

If the information requested is a "public record" under common law and the requestor has a legally recognized interest in the subject matter contained in the material, then the material must be disclosed if the individual's right of access outwelghe the State's interest in preventing disclosure.

Note that any challenge to a dunial of a request for resords under the common law cannot be made to the Government Resords Council, as the Government Resords Council only has jurisdiction to adjudicate challenges to denials of OPRA requests. A challenge to the denial of access under the common law can be made by filling an action in Superior Court.

- All government records are subject to public access under the Open Public Records Act ("OPRA"), unless specifically exempt.
- 2. A request for access to a government record under OPRA must be in writing, hand-delivered, malied, transmitted electronically, or otherwise conveyed to the appropriate custodian. N.J.S.A. 47:1A-5.g. The seven (7) business day response time does not commence until the records custodian receives the request form. If you submit the request form to any other officer or employee of the Name of Agency, that officer or employee must either forward the request to the appropriate custodian, or direct you to the appropriate custodian. N.J.S.A. 47:1A-5.h.
- Requestors may submit requests anonymously. If you elect not to provide a name, address, or telephone number, or other means of contact, the custodian is not required to respond until you reappear before the custodian seeking a response to the original request.
- 4. The fees for duplication of a government record in printed form are listed on the front of this form. We will notify you of any special service charges or other additional charges authorized by State law or regulation before processing your request. Payment shall be made by cash, check or money order payable to the Name of Agency.
- 5. You may be charged a 50% or other deposit when a request for copies exceeds \$25. The Name of Agency custodian will contact you and advise you of any deposit requirements. You agree to pay the balance due upon delivery of the records. Anonymous requests in excess of \$5.00 require a deposit of 100% of estimated fees.
- 6. Under OPRA, a custodian must deny access to a person who has been convoled of an indictable offense in New Jersey, any other state, or the United States, and who is seeking government records containing personal information pertaining to the person's violim or the violim's family. This includes anonymous requests for said information.
- 7. By law, the Name of Agoncy must notify you that it grants or denies a request for access to government records within seven (7) business days after the agency oustodian of records receives the request. If the record requested is not currently available or is in storage, the custodian will advise you within seven (7) business days after receipt of the request when the record can be made available and the estimated cost for reproduction.
- You may be defined access to a government record if your request would substantially disrupt agency operations and the custodian is unable to reach a reasonable solution with you.
- If the Name of Agency is unable to comply with your request for access to a government record, the custodian will indicate the reasons for denial on the request form or other written correspondence and send you a signed and dated copy.
- 10. Except as otherwise provided by law or by agreement with the requester, if the agency custodian of records falls to respond to you within seven (7) business days of receiving a request, the failure to respond is a deemed denial of your request.
- 11. If your request for access to a government record has been dealed or untilled within the seven (7) business days required by law, you have a right to challenge the decision by the *Name of Agency* to deny access. At your option, you may either institute a proceeding in the Superior Court of New Jersey or file a complaint with the Government Records Council ("GRC") by completing the Dental of Access Complaint Form. You may contact the GRC by toll-free telephone at 666-860-0611, by mail at PO Box 819. Trenton, NJ, 08625, by e-mail at gro@dea.state.nj.us, or at their web site at www.state.nj.us/grc. The Council can also answer other questions about the law. All questions regarding complaints filled in Superior Court should be directed to the Court Clerk in your County.
